Alumni Services

Alumni Library Borrowing Privileges

To make the transition from student to alumni and special borrower, complete an application for a [Special Borrower's Card](#) (available at the Harris Library Circulation Desk). [Note: Applications will be available during the Open House on Commencement Day.] Your student ID will no longer be valid or accepted after commencement.



As a Mandel School alumnus you are able to borrow up to six books total from either the Harris Library, the Kelvin Smith Library or through OhioLINK. You may also borrow videos from the Harris Library. You cannot borrow materials from either the Law School's Judge Ben C. Green Library or the Cleveland Health Sciences Libraries.

The Harris Library can no longer support requests to obtain articles through Interlibrary Loan. This type of request must now be made through your local public library.

Alumni Use of the Library Facilities

You may continue to use the Harris Library as an alumnus of the Mandel School. Reference assistance is available and you may use the public terminals on an as-available basis -- with priority going to current Mandel School students. Alumni E-Mail Account

Your University e-mail account will remain active after graduation but only as a forwarding service. We encourage you to have your Case e-mail forwarded to your e-mail account of choice. This will allow e-mail notices from the Harris Library and from the Mandel School to reach you in a timely manner. Alumni Remote Access to Electronic Resources

You will **not** be allowed to access the current OhioLINK research databases and other current library resources from off-campus. Because of licensing agreements with the publishers of the databases only **current** students, staff and faculty of the University have access to these databases. If you are using the VPN as your Internet Provider/Gateway into the University, your access will cease within a week or two of graduation. If you get to the Research Databases through OhioLINK by using your PIN, your privileges will also cease. A large number of research databases are available free through your local public library. Contact them for more information.

However, you may now purchase an Alumni online membership at Kelvin Smith Library to the [KSL Alumni Online Library](#), databases licensed for Case alumni! Click on the link for more detailed information about this service from Kelvin Smith Library.

Alumni Internet Access through the University

Case does **not** offer full internet service. However, there are many inexpensive internet service providers available. You may also wish to continue using the service provider that you used while you were a student.

Please indicate that you are an alumnus of the School. Remember: use of the computer lab terminals is on an as-available basis – with priority going to current Mandel School students.

Graduates: View Your Circulation Record

Graduation is only a few weeks away. Please remember that you **must return** all Case, OhioLINK and ILLiad books and materials that you have checked out before graduation day. You must also **pay** all of your outstanding **fin**es before graduation. To see what you have checked out, or if you owe any fines, go to the library catalog and click on the [VIEW YOUR LIBRARY RECORD](#) link. You can also call (216-368-2302) or stop in and ask for assistance at the Harris Library Circulation Desk. People with outstanding debts will have their diplomas and transcripts withheld until the debt has been cleared.



[Digital Audio, Video, & Pictures Available Through OhioLINK's DMC](#)

Where can you go to view pictures of great art from around the world, view a map of Cleveland from the 1800s, and watch a video about urban renewal? The [OhioLINK Digital Media Center \(DMC\)](#) offers all of these and much more.

The **Multi-subject Video** section is very popular and contains over 2,100 Educational Films and Documentaries as well as over 270 Foreign Language Instruction videos.

The *Educational Films and Documentaries* span a variety of subjects that includes many topics relevant to social workers. These include videos on death and dying, urban renewal, discrimination, mental illness, and many other topics. These films can be streamed over the internet or downloaded and use the RealPlayer format. This collection is restricted to current faculty, staff, and students of OhioLINK institutions and requires authentication for off-campus use.

The *Foreign Language Video Instruction* videos show native speakers conversing about many different topics from their unique viewpoint. The languages that are currently available are: Arabic, Mandarin Chinese, French, German, Russian, Spanish, and Swahili. These videos can be streamed or downloaded as well, but they use the QuickTime format and are open to the general public for viewing.

The **Art & Architecture** section showcases an extensive collection of art from museums and universities around the world. Included in this collection are some well-known masterpieces as well as works by lesser-known artists. Also included in this section are some collections from Ohio colleges that are special in nature. One of these special collections is the *WPA Print collection* from Case's very own Kelvin Smith Library which contains artwork created in Cleveland during the Great Depression under the Works Progress Administration.

The **History & Archives** section includes a great deal of primary historical research. This section includes some very important collections including: *Kent State*

Shootings Oral Histories are a group of recordings of interviews with the people who witnessed aspects of the events of May 4, 1970. The *National Underground Railroad Freedom Center Digital Images* is a more recent collection which includes images of original documents and prints that concern slavery, abolition, and emancipation.

There is also a **Science** section that includes geology and forestry images, recorded bird calls, and images of microscopic slides.

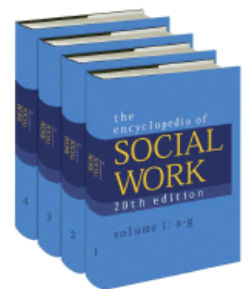
The OhioLINK Digital Media Center is a powerful multimedia resource that is available to all members of OhioLINK institutions 24 hours a day. New things are added regularly, so check in often. If you have never visited before and are looking for some new videos (and don't want to have to remember to return it by the due date) visit the DMC and see how the libraries of OhioLINK are bringing resources right to your desktop.

BLACKBOARD OFFERS PODCAST TOOL

Do you know that you can upload your recordings of your lectures and other audio or video files to Blackboard, and disseminate them to your students? The new Podcast Tool allows instructors to create podcasts for their classes and deliver them to their students. The tool creates a new content type called Podcast Episode, which appears with other documents in the content area. Students can either download and listen to individual files or subscribe to the podcast using iTunes or another podcasting client.

The process takes a couple of steps that includes uploading the audio or video file, and making the podcast accessible to iTunes. The following websites have detailed instructions on adding Podcast Episodes to your course site:

MOBILE LAB AVAILABLE

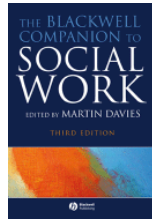

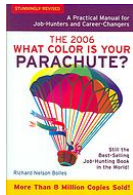
[Finding Jobs in Social Work and the Nonprofit Sector](#)

The Foundation Center website also has [Frequently Asked Questions](#) about nonprofit employment, which has a lot of useful information for jobseekers in the nonprofit sector.

Philanthropy Careers

Compiled by the *Chronicle of Philanthropy*, Philanthropy Careers lists jobs available in public charities and also private foundations. Users have a number of search options they use to find postings and the site has articles related to career development and can be accessed by nonsubscribers. In addition, there is a link to the [Job Seeker's Primer](#).

The NonProfit Times Jobs

The newspaper of the nonprofit sector, *The NonProfit Times*, offers a searchable job database that is accessible through a free registration. Jobseekers also have the option to post resumes and subscribe to a weekly e-mail alert.

If you are interested in searching for a job in the Cleveland area, the [Harris Library's Agency File](#) web page has links to local nonprofits, which should help you to create a list of agencies to consider. Furthermore, many organizations post their job vacancies on their own sites.

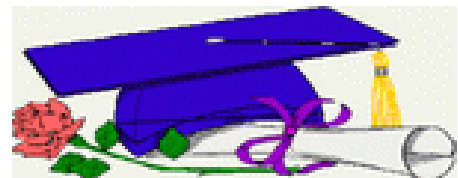
