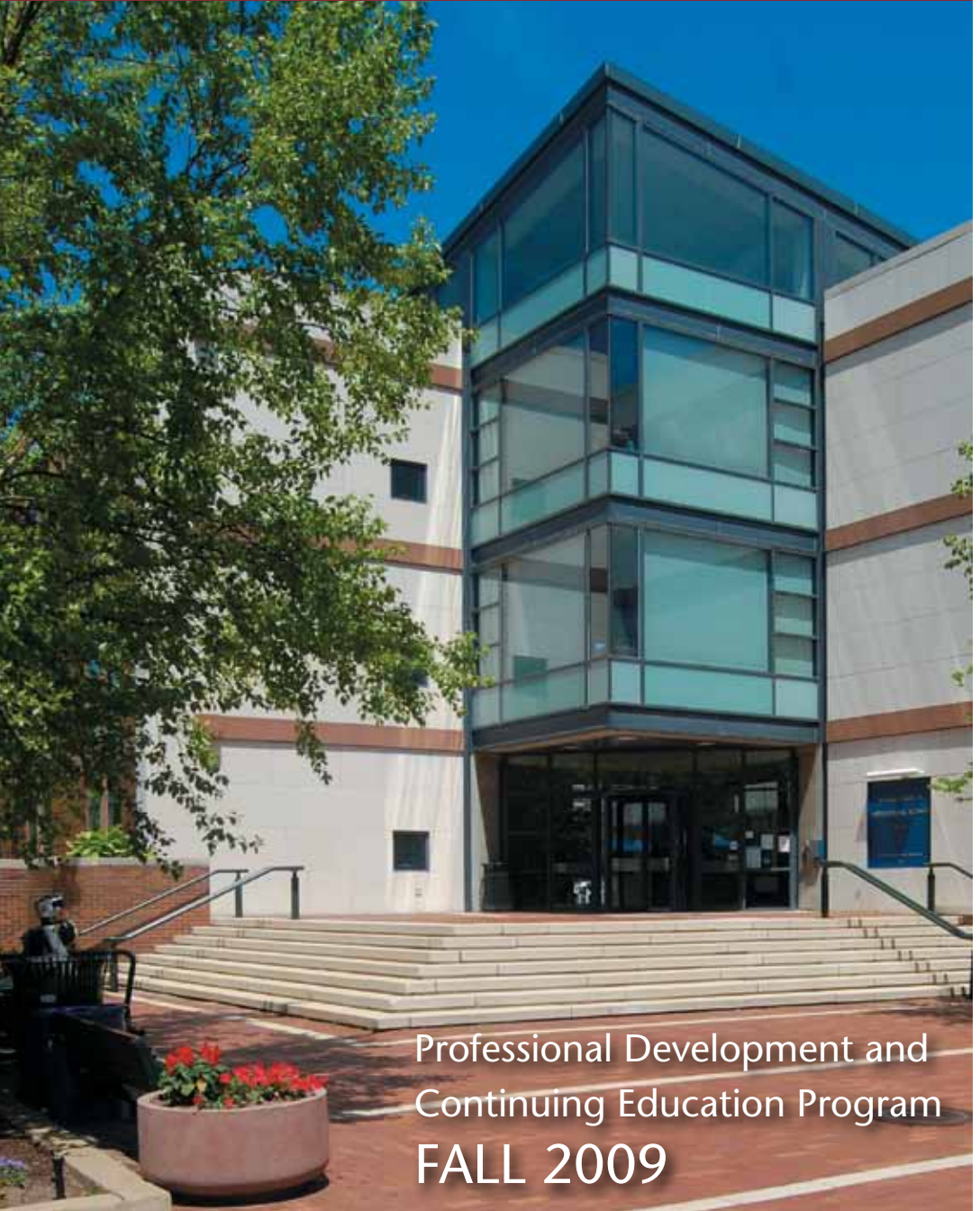

Alec Baldwin was taped using highly derogatory language toward his then 11-year-old daughter. After much nationwide, mostly negative publicity about the incident, he published a book he co-authored, entitled, A Promise to Ourselves: A Journey through Fatherhood and Divorce. In this book he alleges that he was driven to speak to his daughter this way by his ex-wife, because she had “alienated” his daughter from him. He devotes 20 pages expounding on the “Parental Alienation Syndrome” (PAS). In this presentation, Judge Gothard shows how perpetrators often use the media, politicians, and particularly the courts to shift the paradigm so that they are perceived as victims. The focus becomes the “alienating” parent, all too often causing the original complaint(s) of child abuse or neglect to be ignored.

Exposure to violence transforms children’s view of the world, their emotional landscape and their ability to trust.

Working through one's grief can be an opportunity for transformation and personal growth. Growth and suffering, positive transformation and distress often co-exist on the pathway from loss to the development of a 'New Normal'. Because workshop space is limited, admission cannot be guaranteed without pre-registration. REFUND POLICY/CANCELLATIONS

REACHING MSASS

MSASS and the University are located four miles east of downtown Cleveland in an area known as University Circle on Euclid Avenue (U.S. Routes 6, 20, and 322). Most road maps of Ohio have the University clearly indicated.

By Car

If you are coming from the east via Interstate 90, exit at Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. Follow the boulevard south to Euclid Avenue. Turn left at Euclid and follow it three blocks to Ford Road. Turn left onto Ford and go one block to Bellflower Road.

If you are coming from the east via Interstate 80 or the Pennsylvania Turnpike, follow signs leading to the Ohio Turnpike. Remain on the Ohio Turnpike until you reach Interchange 13. Exit there and proceed north on Interstate 480 which merges with Interstate 271. Exit from Interstate 271 at Mayfield Road-West; Follow Mayfield Road to Euclid Avenue. Go across Euclid Avenue and Mayfield Road becomes Ford Drive - go one block to Bellflower Road.

If you are coming from the west via the Ohio Turnpike, exit at Interchange 8A and follow 90 east. In the downtown area, exit onto Chester Avenue until it ends at Euclid Avenue. Turn left at Euclid and follow it three blocks to Ford Drive. Turn left on Ford and go one block to Bellflower Road.

If you are coming from the south via Interstate 71 or Interstate 77, stay on either of these roads until you reach Interstate 90 in the downtown area. Follow Interstate 90 east to the Chester Avenue exit and proceed east on Chester until it ends at Euclid Avenue. Turn left at Euclid and follow it three blocks to Ford Drive. Turn left on Ford and go one block to Bellflower Road.

Free Shuttle Bus Service

University Circle maintains a free shuttle bus service that connects the University Rapid Transit station on Cedar Road with strategic points in the Circle. Shuttle buses travel two specific routes at 10 and 20 minute intervals, depending on the time of day and volume of passengers. Services vary after 6 p.m. and on weekends. 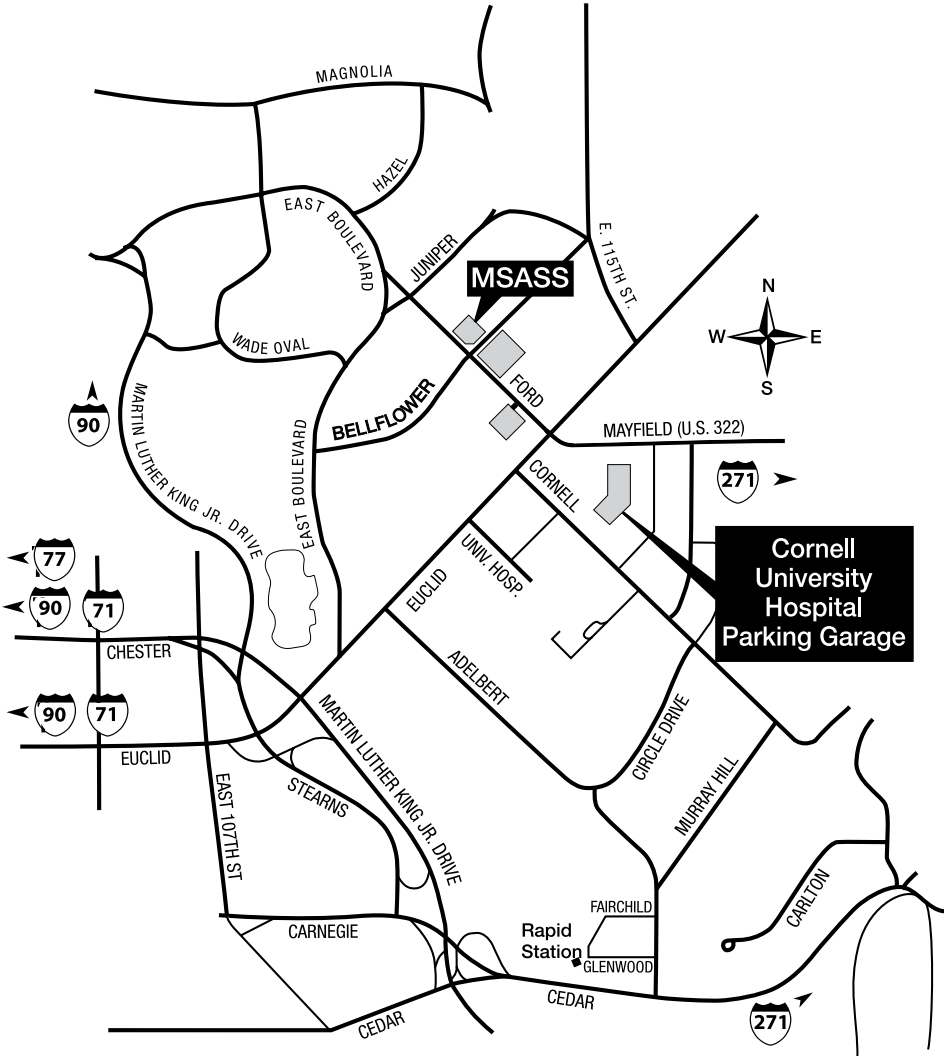
Parking
