Appreciative Inquiry is the cooperative search for the best in people, their organizations, and the world around them, linking a group's "positive core" with a change agenda to suddenly and democratically create changes never thought possible. AI is a methodology that invites all stakeholders to actively participate through a five-phased process of Define, Discovery, Dream, Design, and Delivery. Known as the 5-D Cycle, this process provides a practical way for people to connect to the capabilities, strengths, and lived experience within their community or organizations, create a shared vision of the future, and mobilize creative action toward its realization.

# WORKSHOPS

## #•2728 Treatment of Disruptive Behavior Disorders in Children and Adolescents

Mon., June 4 (9:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m.)

This workshop is for child and family therapists who treat children aged 3-12 years old with Oppositional-Defiant Disorder, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, and other disruptive behavior disturbances. Following a brief review of the main diagnostic features of these disorders, we will examine the etiological processes thought to be responsible for their development and will discuss connections between etiology and treatment strategy. Then, we will review the treatment outcome research and identify the several interventions that have been shown to be effective with disruptive behavior disorders. Most of the training will consist of step-by-step instruction in these empirically supported techniques. Parent training involves, showing caregivers how to use effective prompts and cues, ignoring minor negative behaviors, effective praise for positive behavior, charting, systematic reinforcement systems, response costs, and time out. Training the child in a structured problem-solving technique is also an empirically supported component of therapy for disruptive behavior. Finally, we will discuss family systems interventions that can supplement the more structured, cognitive-behavioral techniques. Throughout the workshop, clinical examples from the instructor and participants will be used to illustrate how the interventions can be modified and customized for individual clients.

## §#•2729 Integrative Couple Therapy

Thurs., June 7 (9:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m.)

This workshop presents a method of positive, short-term, highly structured, goal-directed couple counseling. A specific format for marital assessment will be introduced that utilizes written assessment instruments with interview data.

Methods of commitment enhancement and communication change, the importance of nonverbal behavioral relationship contracts and decision-making and conflict management styles will be explored.

Participants will learn to differentiate between those couples who can benefit from cognitive-behavioral strategies and those that need to learn a way of accepting their irreconcilable differences by building greater intimacy through empathic joining around these differences. Strategies based on emotional focused couple therapy will be presented.

### **#•2730 Multiculturalism: What About Cambodia and Vietnam? Ties to a Global Society**

Fri., June 8 (1/2 day a.m. 9:00 a.m.-12:15 p.m.)

Dr. DeLuca will discuss the first American Psychological Delegation Trip to Southeast Asia: Cambodia and Vietnam. As a member of that delegation, Dr. DeLuca will explore and discuss historical facts such as the lasting effects of the Vietnam War, the brutal history of Pol Pot's Khmer Rouge Regime in Cambodia (1975-1979) Killing Fields, and landmine victims, today. Such events have left mental health scars on people's lives, yet the Asian people are resilient and remain optimistic. The social, intellectual, and moral movement known as Multiculturalism has been enormously influential in psychology and the mental health field.

What are the current, mental health needs of the Vietnamese and Cambodian people? A mutual exchange of the mental health and educational needs between American and Asian professionals will be explored. Developing an understanding and gaining insights will promote a solid foundation toward building effective multiculturalism and collaboration between peoples.

This workshop will be valuable for: physicians, psychologists, social workers, professional counselors, school counselors, and teachers interested in opportunities to improve the education and mental health standards in building peace and understanding in the world.

The simple logic of this perspective provides reassurance to staff and leadership that many current “challenges” are actually signs of past successes and signals of an emerging new next stage of development and its evolving culture.

Some diseases, such as Alzheimer's Disease, exacerbate these sensory changes. The workshop will describe changes that occur in visual perception as part of healthy aging and in Alzheimer's Disease. Many examples of changes in vision that can affect every-day life will be presented. Methods for recognizing these changes in our own lives and those for whom we care will be discussed. The workshop is meant for anyone who plans to grow older and/or who cares for a person who is growing older. It will also be of particular interest to individuals who are working with persons diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease.

Stress not only causes these diseases, but also impedes the effectiveness of any treatment provided by a practitioner. The simplest reason is that in times of stress the body becomes stiff and rigid thereby cutting off critical blood supply to the parts of the body that need it the most.

As a health care practitioner, you have to think on your feet providing safety and the best health care techniques for your patients. In this workshop, you will learn techniques and skills that will help you to effectively relax the mind and body of your patients. In addition, the techniques learned will help both the client and practitioner be relaxed and stress free in your normal life as well as in the clinical setting.

It is designed for social workers, marriage and family therapists, counselors, chemical dependency professionals, psychologists, nurses, as well as managers and administrators in health care settings. ## §#•2738 Social Work in Hospice and End-of-Life Care

Death remains one of the most powerful and fascinating of all human experiences. The complicated ways in which physical, social, psychological, ethical and spiritual issues intermingle throughout the death and dying process require social workers who practice in hospice care settings to develop a unique and comprehensive set of skills. To be effective in this field, social workers must find ways to adapt what they have learned throughout their professional training to fit the specific needs of individuals at the end of life. As a first step, this seminar will help the participant to explore and discover: 1) the basics of hospice and end-of-life care with answers to such questions as “what, who, how, when, where and why”, 2) the role of the social workers in end-of-life care including the attitudes and skills needed for effective work with dying patients and their loved ones, 3) the rewards and challenges of being part of a “transdisciplinary” team, and 4) the many ethical issues that social workers confront in end-of-life care. Teaching methods for the day will mix didactic teaching with stories from actual patient experiences, movie/video excerpts, audio/music excerpts, and experiential exercises.

These include infant, international, domestic, transracial, single parent, and gay and lesbian adoption. The challenges of raising children with special needs will be emphasized to foster professional understanding of the challenges adoptive families face when they strive to raise children with behavior and emotional problems, seek treatment and interface with society. Special topics such as sibling groups, open adoption, adopting the older child, and adopting children with histories of severe developmental trauma will be covered. The interface of the adoptive parents own attachment style and personality needs will be addressed.

A portion of the afternoon session will be devoted to an adoptive parent panel to encourage sharing and lively discussion about pertinent issues. Thus, participants will gain hands on insight into the life of the adoptive family to promote professional competency in working with adoptive families.

He is a Professor and former Chair of the School of Social Work at Cleveland State University, Cleveland, OH., where he has been on the faculty for three decades. Practitioners of this model match their approach to the readiness level of the person they are assisting. They strive to maintain a therapeutic alliance and to respect the autonomy and personal wisdom of the individuals with whom they work.

This workshop will introduce participants to the philosophical roots and essential constructs of the model, and provide opportunities to apply its techniques to clinical cases through small group

discussion, demonstration of techniques, and role-play. The workshop provides an orientation to the model. Becoming proficient in its delivery will require on-going attention to its principles, practical experience with its strategies, and support from colleagues/supervisors/administrators.

This workshop focuses on the assessment of clients who present to the practitioner as having psychiatric-like symptoms, but who may, in actuality, have a substance-related disorder, a mental health disorder, or both. These clients pose a challenge for the assessor: how does one determine whether there is a substance abuse problem present, and how can these findings be integrated into the mental health background of the patient? This workshop begins with the theory of chemical/psychological assessment, and proceeds to introduce precise screening and evaluation techniques.

The presentation is geared toward both chemical dependency and mental health professionals. It is appropriate for chemical dependency staff who wish to learn more about the theory and practice of dual-diagnostic evaluation instruments for substance abuse. It is also appropriate for social workers and counselors who desire an introduction to the significance of substance abuse theory in diagnosing and treating patients with both disorders. Time will be spent on DSM criteria for abuse and dependency, and helpful adjunctive criteria. The importance of historical data and mental status observations in the diagnosis of dual-disorder patients will also be stressed, along with techniques for collecting that information. Both adult and adolescent populations are addressed.

# REACHING MSASS

The School and University are located four miles east of downtown Cleveland in an area known as University Circle on Euclid Avenue (U.S. Routes 6, 20, and 322). Most road maps of Ohio have the University clearly indicated.

## By Car

**If you are coming from the east via Interstate 90**, exit at Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. Follow the boulevard south to Euclid Avenue. Turn left at Euclid and follow it three blocks to Ford Road. Turn left onto Ford and go one block to Bellflower Road.

**If you are coming from the east via Interstate 80 or the Pennsylvania Turnpike**, follow signs leading to the Ohio Turnpike. Remain on the Ohio Turnpike until you reach Interchange 13. Exit there and proceed north on Interstate 480 which merges with Interstate 271. Exit from Interstate 271 at Mayfield Road-West; Follow Mayfield Road to Euclid Avenue. Go across Euclid Avenue and Mayfield Road becomes Ford Drive - go one block to Bellflower Road.

**If you are coming from the west via the Ohio Turnpike**, exit at Interchange 8A and follow 90 east. In the downtown area, exit onto Chester Avenue until it ends at Euclid Avenue. Turn left at Euclid and follow it three blocks to Ford Drive. Turn left on Ford and go one block to Bellflower Road.

**If you are coming from the south via Interstate 71 or Interstate 77**, stay on either of these roads until you reach Interstate 90 in the downtown area. Follow Interstate 90 east to the Chester Avenue exit and proceed east on Chester until it ends at Euclid Avenue. Turn left at Euclid and follow it three blocks to Ford Drive. Turn left on Ford and go one block to Bellflower Road.

## Free Shuttle Bus Service

University Circle maintains a free shuttle bus service that connects the University Rapid Transit station on Cedar Road with strategic points in the Circle. Shuttle buses travel two specific routes at 10 and 20 minute intervals, depending on the time of day and volume of passengers. Services vary after 6 p.m. and on weekends.

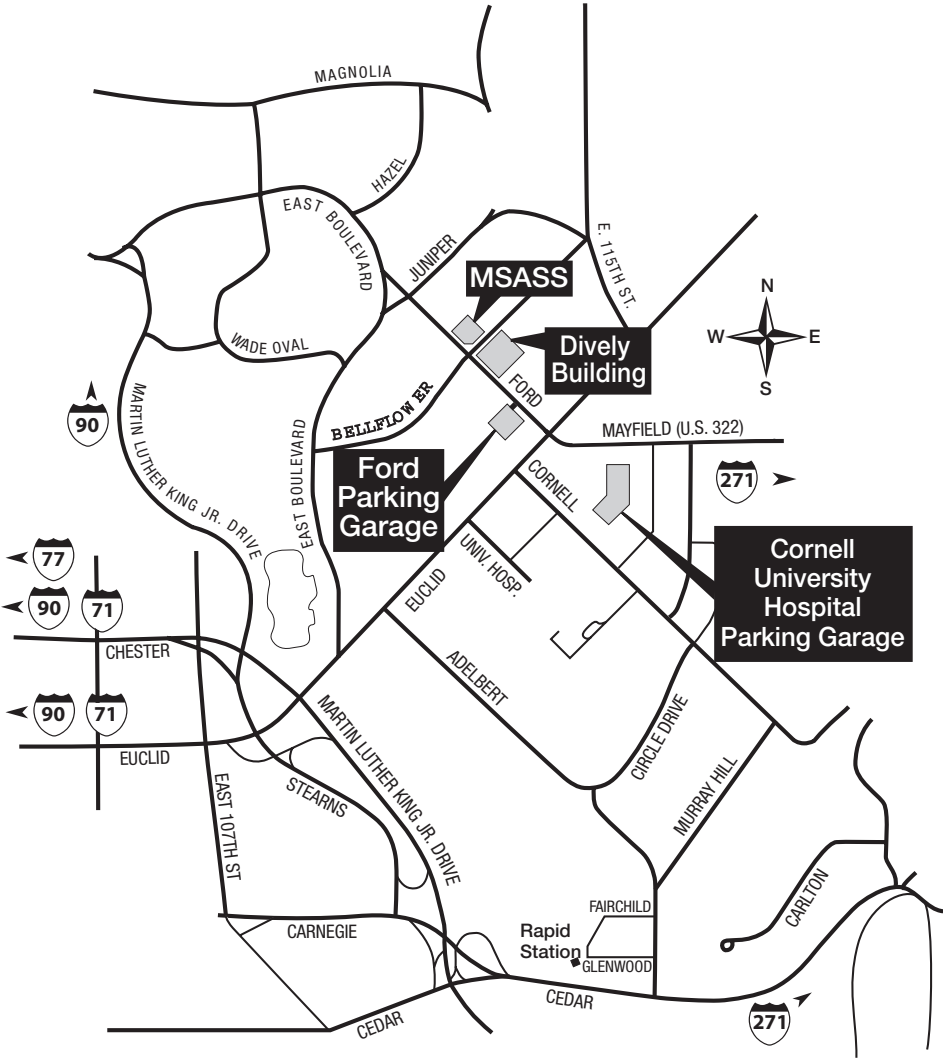
## Parking
